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- Susan B. Anthony, born 1820, daughter of the Quaker abolitionist, Daniel Anthony,
- in association with Lucretia Mott and Elizabeth Stanton crusaded to achieve for women the rights of citizenship equal with men;
- a stubborn, intelligent woman, she squinted fiercely at the world through tiny, sharp glasses, and fought tirelessly in lecture halls, courts and Congress a life-long battle to improve the legal and social status of women;
- her goal was achieved fourteen years after her death in 1906, when passage of the Nineteenth Amendment granted women suffrage.

The play begins with a Prologue.
