

#### **Cast and Crew Biographies**

**Hilary Buffum** (*Director*) is a Bay Area actor and director and an alum of the San Francisco State Theatre department. She has directed short new works including most recently Enough by Haunah King. She also co-produced two Shakespeare plays with HearthFire theatre company in 2015 and 2016. She is excited to be directing this staged reading of Machinal.

**Illan F. Halpern** (*Ensemble*) has acted in plays in Brazil, Canada and both coasts of the United States. He holds a Physics Ph.D. from UC Berkeley, and a Theater Arts minor from MIT. After *Lysistrata* last fall, he's happy to be back with **Actors Ensemble** for another play reading.

**Jen Halsing** (*Ensemble*) is delighted to join the cast of Machinal. Most recently, she performed in **AEB**'s 2019 Fall Staged Reading series in *Jizo*. Other credits include the following North Carolina Theatre productions: *Ragtime, A Chorus Line, Beauty and the Beast* and *Joseph and the Amazing Technicolor Dreamcoat*.

#### **About Machinal**

**Machinal** is a 1928 play by American playwright and journalist, Sophie Treadwell. Its Broadway premiere with Clark Gable as the lover is considered one of the high points of expressionist theater on the American stage. Sophie Treadwell was a campaigning journalist in America between the wars. Among her assignments was the sensational murder involving Ruth Snyder, who with her lover, Judd Gray, had murdered her husband and gone to the electric chair. Out of this came *Machinal*, a powerful drama about the dependent status of women and the living hell of a loveless marriage. The play was revived in New York and London in the 1990s and more recently at the Roundahout Theater in NY in 2014

**Expressionism** developed in Europe (principally Germany) in the early decades of the 20th century and later in the United States. It forms part of the broader movement of Expressionism in the arts. Expressionism enjoyed a brief period of popularity in American theater in the 1920's, including plays by Eugene O'Neill (*The Hairy Ape, Emperor Jones* and *The Great God Brown*), Elmer Rice (*The Adding Machine*) and *Machinal*. Expressionist plays often dramatize the suffering and spiritual awakening of their protagonists. Instead of long acts and scenes, they often have short scenes or a series of episodes as in *Machinal -* **Vicki Siegel, AEB Board Member and Dramaturge**
