A Note from the Director

And where two raging fires meet together, They do consume the thing that feeds their fury.

Was Shakespeare a misogynist? I've read articles condemning *The Taming of the Shrew* among others of his plays for their sexism. "Toxic masculinity" is sometimes tossed about especially in reference to this play. But I don't believe Shakespeare was a misogynist. Certainly, he was a person of his very patriarchal time, but in fact I think he was *ahead* of his time. It's impossible for me to believe that a misogynist would have created Rosalind or Viola, Cleopatra or Juliet, among so many other powerful women's characters.

Let's not forget that in Shakespeare's theatre, the women's roles were played by men, undoubtedly reinforcing gender bias. Sixteenth-century women were property, lacking in any kind of agency. In *Shrew*, Katherine's father, Baptista, most clearly represents this. His sole interest is in marrying off his two daughters to the highest bidders. Katherine's sister, Bianca, has learned to "play the game"; Katherine, intelligent and ahead of her time, refuses to play.

Enter Petruchio, seemingly a *man's man* if ever there was: "I come to wive it wealthily in Padua; if wealthily then happily in Padua," he arrogantly brags. But then he meets Katherine and his life and outlook will be changed: not in an instant, not in a day, but gradually, he will be fundamentally changed. At least that is what we hope our production of this classic will reveal. Yes, we've made some adjustments to the text, but then I think if the Bard were alive today, he'd make a few of his own, as well.

Finally, an acknowledgment: The most brilliant production of *Shrew* I have ever seen was William Ball's *Commedia dell'Arte*-infused production for San Francisco's ACT in the 1970's. I must pay homage to Ball and that production, and when we have borrowed from it, please know that we only borrow from the very best! Utilizing the feel of *Commedia*, we invite you, our audience, to be active participants. Call out! Laugh! Applaud! Join in with the fun! And thank you for supporting live theatre!

In Alphabetical Order

Lyre Alston (he/him/she/her) (Costumes) is a designer working in and around the bay area in both Costume design and Wig/Makeup design/artistry. Some recent shows include *Hadestown* with Throckmorton Theatre, *Daisy* with Hillbarn Theatre, *Peter Panto* at Presidio Theatre, and with AE Cymbeline earlier this year, *Death of a Salesman* last Fall and Much Ado About Nothing and The Imaginary Invalid last summer.

Al Badger (Merchant/Ensemble) is honored to return to Actors Ensemble for the second time since 2012's *Arcadia*, after playing Belarius earlier this summer in *Cymbeline*. In what time remains after yarn crafting and feral cat maintenance, he has performed many times with San Francisco's Generation Theater, most notably as Escartefigue in Marcel Pagnol's *Marseille Trilogy*.
